

Worship Focus: Glory is Hidden in Order to Be Revealed

Would you look directly at the sun? Only if you wanted to burn your retinas and have permanent blind spots. Would you like to look directly at God? It sounds wonderful in theory. Yet Scripture describes God's glory as being brighter than the sun. Moreover, one component of God's glory is his holiness. Being holy doesn't just mean God loves good; he also hates evil with burning intensity. And we sin every day. No wonder the Lord once told Moses, "No one may see me and live" (Exodus 33:20). Sinners would die of fear if they saw God in all his holy glory. So, how then can we possibly know God? How can we draw near to him without dying of terror? In our final epiphany moment of this season, God explains. God hides his glory in order to reveal himself. To carry out his good and glorious work of salvation, Jesus hid his glory and went to the cross. To allow sinners to stare at his glory without fear or harm, God hides it in the gospel. In the gospel, we see the glory of Christ's love, power, and salvation. The reality is that when God's glory is hidden, it is most on display.

First Reading Exodus 34:29-35

The glory of God was reflected in the two-sided covenant of the law which God established through Moses. It made people afraid. Through Christ God would establish a new and greater covenant which would remove all our fears.

When Moses came down from Mount Sinai, with the two tablets of the Testimony in his hand as he came down from the mountain, Moses did not realize that the skin of his face was shining because he had been speaking with the LORD. ³⁰ When Aaron and all the people of Israel saw Moses, they were amazed that the skin of his face was shining, so they were afraid to come close to him. ³¹ Moses called to them, so Aaron and all the rulers of the community returned to him, and Moses spoke to them. ³² Afterward, all the people of Israel came close to him, and he gave them all of the commands that the LORD had spoken to him on Mount Sinai. ³³ When Moses was finished speaking with them, he put a veil over his face. ³⁴ But whenever Moses went in before the LORD to speak with him, he would take the veil off until he came out again. Then he would come out and tell the people of Israel what he had been commanded. ³⁵ Whenever the people of Israel saw Moses' face, they would see that the skin of Moses' face was shining. Then Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with the LORD again.





The glory of God, hidden in Christ, shines through on the Mount of Transfiguration.

About eight days after he said these words, Jesus took Peter, John, and James and went up on the mountain to pray. ²⁹ While he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothing became dazzling white. ³⁰ Just then, two men, Moses and Elijah, were talking with him! ³¹ They appeared in glory and were talking about his departure, which he was going to bring to fulfillment in Jerusalem. ³² Peter and those with him were weighed down with sleep, but when they were completely awake, they saw his glory and the two men standing with him. ³³ As the men were leaving Jesus, Peter said to him, "Master, it is good for us to be here. 

Lenten Donation Opportunities 2025

The St. Peter's Outreach team is sponsoring two donation opportunities during this Lenten season. We thank the congregation for their generosity in the past several years. Feed My People, Lakeshore CAP and HELP of Door County, Inc. are very appreciative and thankful for the items they receive. The dates for both collections have been extended this year to include two weekend services.

Food Donations: March 7 through March 17

We will be collecting nonperishable food items. These items will be donated to Feed My People and Lakeshore CAP. In addition, some of the items we collect will be used to stock the Blessings Box located on Maple Street in front of church. The Blessings Box is stocked as needed by Kary however, anyone is welcome to add temperature sensitive food and personal care items to the Blessings Box throughout the year. Suggested nonperishable food item donations include jams and jellies, crackers, tuna, rice mixes, miscellaneous soups, cake mixes, packaged dinners, box mixes like Hamburger Helper and Tuna Helper, Ramen and other noodle types and other nonperishable food.

March 5 - Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday (from the Latin *Dies Cinerum*, meaning "Day of Ashes") is the first day of Lent. On this day, Christians focus intensely on their utter and complete sinfulness and the necessity of Christ's suffering and death to earn their salvation. Ashes are referred to many times in the Old Testament as a sign of sorrow, mourning, repentance, and mortality (see 2 Samuel 13:19; Job 42:6; and Jeremiah 6:26).



There are is a mistaken impression that having ashes on Ash Wednesday is a "Catholic" thing. However, many Lutheran churches use ashes during Ash Wednesday worship as part of a rite called the *Imposition of Ashes*. According to this ancient custom, ashes (traditionally made by burning palm fronds used on Palm Sunday of the previous year) are mixed with a small amount of olive oil and applied to the forehead or hand of the worshipper.

Symbolism of receiving ashes on the forehead or hand:

St. Peter's, at this time, does not make use of this ancient rite (possibly next year). But the rite has a great deal of symbolism that helps to focus our worship and attention on our Savior, Jesus.




In this ancient rite, the minister applies ashes in the sign of the cross on the forehead or hand while saying, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." This mark, in the sign of a cross, is a powerful reminder of our depraved and sinful nature and total dependence on God for forgiveness and salvation.

It is also a reminder of baptism. At your baptism, the minister made the sign of the cross on your forehead and said, "Receive the sign of the holy cross to mark you as one redeemed by Christ the crucified." Even though the ashes represent our sin and our need for forgiveness, the sign of the cross reminds

us that Jesus has died to forgive us and rose to give us life. His death, His resurrection, and His life were given to you at your baptism, as St. Paul writes, "We were buried with Christ through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life." (Romans 6:4)

When you return home and wash off the ashes from your forehead or hand, this too is a powerful reminder of baptism. You are reminded of how, through water and the Word of God, you were given Jesus who washes your sins away, as St. Paul writes, "God saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life." (Titus 3:5-8)



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
